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Inkster Public Schools no more

The welcome sign will not be out this fall

The Viking ship has been docked for good. The Inkster Public School District has been officially dissolved.

The district, along with Buena Vista Public Schools, could not produce documents proving that they could get financing or an opinion that the districts could be financially viable by a 5 p.m. deadline this past Monday, and will be dissolved.

A letter from the office of state treasurer Andy Dillon, dated July 22 stated that "neither Inkster Public Schools nor the Buena Vista School District submitted documentation necessary to avoid disorganization and dissolution under Public Act (PA) 96 of 2013 by today's 5:00 p.m. (EST) deadline. Therefore, the dissolution process, pursuant to PA 96 will move forward."

There will be a special meeting at the Wayne Regional Education Service Agency (RESA) headquarters, at 33500 Van Born in Wayne, tonight at 6 p.m. Wayne RESA is the intermediate school district which oversees Inkster Public Schools and has the responsibility of declaring the district dissolved

Remembering the Detroit Riot of 1967



Detroit 1967 Riot on 12th St

The Detroit Race Riot in 1967 was one of the most violent urban revolts in the 20th century. It came as an immediate response to police brutality but underlying conditions including segregated housing and schools and rising black unemployment helped drive the anger of the rioters.

Forty-six years ago, during the long, hot summer of 1967, the city of Detroit erupted in one of the deadliest and costliest riots in the history of the United States. Reportedly sparked by a police raid on an

unlicensed bar on July 23, the conflagration lasted four terrifying days and nights, left scores dead and hundreds injured, thousands arrested, untold numbers of businesses looted, hundreds of buildings utterly destroyed and Detroit's

Federal judge freezes lawsuits Detroit bankruptcy



DETROIT — U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Steven Rhodes has put a stop to lawsuits threatening Detroit's bankruptcy and declared that he will handle any challenges.

The decision came after two hours of arguments at a hearheld earlier Wednesday. A county judge last week said Gov. Rick Snyder ignored the Michigan Constitution and acted illegally in approving the Chapter 9 bankruptcy filing for the City of Detroit.

Retirees sued, claiming their pensions are protected by the constitution and are at risk in a bankruptcy.

U.S. Bankruptcy Judge Steven Rhodes was asked to decide whether city retirees can slow or stop that process by filing lawsuits in other courts over the filing of bankruptcy by the City of Detroit. Detroit is the largest U.S. city to file for bankruptcy protection. Gov. Rick Snyder signed off on the bankruptcy last week, calling it the only "feasible path" for a city whose population has plummeted to

week. Joseph Orlando and Brenna Machus, both 20 years old were the victims. Orlando had been fatally shot

when his body was found by employees on Tuesday morning. Police began a search for Brenna Machus, whose body

was discovered near the Southfield Freeway service drive and Michigan Avenue in Dearborn two days later.

Machus died from a single gunshot wound, according to preliminary autopsy results released Friday by the Wayne County Medical Examiner's office. Her death was ruled a homicide.

Orlando and Brenna had been working together on Monday evening. Police put out several alerts last week, asking for the public's help in identifying two possible witnesses who were inside the store that night. Anyone with information should call Crime Stoppers or the Dearborn Police.

and redrawing district boundaries.

Inkster initially had a deficit exceeding \$15 million before securing a \$12.4 million emergency loan from the state on June 6.

A public meeting was held in Lansing on July 18 to discuss the proceeding of the bill that would allow state superintendent Mike Flanagan and state treasurer Andy Dillon to concur and dissolve small school districts deemed to be financially insolvent. Many Inkster residents and board members traveled to attend the meeting, and gave impassioned pleas to the two men.

The deficit elimination plan submitted by the district initially called for consolidation of Meek-Milton and Baylor-Woodson Elementary Schools and Blanchette Middle School into a single K-8 building run directly by the district, while transforming the high school into a charter school.

"We were praised by Mr. Flanagan for this being an innovative plan and characteristic of outside-the-box thinking," Inkster superintendent Mischa Bashir said.

Inkster business manager Kelley Howey said that she had been working with Comerica Bank to secure financing for the district to pay off vendor bills and continue operations.

"Much of my ability to get the loan depends on the outcome of

this meeting," Howey said. Flanagan and Dillon moved to extend the deadline to 5 p.m. on July 22 to allow each district to produce documentation showing that they had access to finances or a commitment letter from a lender, in addition to an opinion letter from each district's accounting firm stating that the financing would allow the district to stay open for the entire school year.

A letter from the Inkster district, also dated July 22, said that "the state Department of Education has advised the District that although the District has submitted an acceptable DEP, the State lacks confidence that the District can implement the DEP. The State has not, however, advised the district of the standard or criteria by which it made this lack of confidence determination."

The letter also said that:
First, Comerica Bank advised the District that approval of a loan was contingent on the District having an approved DEP. Thus, although the District has adopted an acceptable DEP, the State Department of Education, as stated above, has declined to approve the DEP, thereby hindering the District's ability to secure a loan from Comerica Bank.

Second, the District's accounting firm has advised the District that it cannot provide the required opinion because, under AICPA Standards (AT 9101), CPAs are prohibited from rendering any kind of opinion on solvency. Thus, the neither the District's accounting firm nor any other CPA firm can provide the opinion required by the State. Alternatively, the District and its accounting firm are willing to meet with the Michigan Department of Education and the State Department of Treasury to discuss in detail all assumptions used in developing the DEP.

Inkster Schools board member Ruth Williams said that the school had managed to secure the loan from Comerica. "We had it. They said that they would fund us," she said.

There had been talk of turning the entire district into charter schools. Inkster Schools had gone the charter route before, in 2000, but superintendent Mischa Bashir said that turning the entire district into a charter would not be profitable enough and yield results in the given time frame specified in the DEP. "Making the entire district into a charter school would only yield 3 percent revenue, and that would not put a big enough dent into the deficit to pay it off within three years," Bashir said.

"At a special school board meeting this past Tuesday, Wayne RESA superintendent Chris Wigent expressed some of his displeasure with the verdict from Lansing. "This was something that was rammed down our throats, but we have to keep moving forward," Wigent said. "To rush this through as recently happened, so close to the school year with so many unanswered questions, we do think that that's inappropriate."

The four districts that Wigent has had conversations with concerning reassignment of students in the district are the Taylor School District, Wayne-Westland Community Schools, Westwood Community Schools, and Romulus Community Schools.

Williams stated that much was done to try to save the district. "The state made it seem like we didn't do our homework," she said. "We did. We laid off staff, consolidated buildings, privatized transportation. We cut our debt by almost \$7 million. We worked hard to save this district."

Inkster school board president Jean Fuller expressed her disappointment with passion. "Say what you will about me, but one thing is for certain is that I love Inkster," she said. A major point of concern were transportation issues for the reassigned children, as well as who would control the buildings of the former district.

The buildings would be controlled by the district whose boundaries those buildings reside in, while transport would remain an issue. "There are many kids that won't go to school if they miss that bus," Fuller said. "If they miss so many days, then their families could lose a lot of their benefits. The kids could get taken away."

Even though the district is gone, the debt will still remain. 18 mills from non-homestead property taxes will go towards repaying the loan debt and deficit.

There will be a rally outside Inkster High School, located at 3250 Middlebelt Road, on Friday to protest the closing of the schools as well as general conditions in Inkster.

More jobs for Michiganders and an expanding work force

Michigan's economy keeps getting stronger, and that's encouraging thousands of Michiganders to start looking for work.

Last month, the total number of employed workers in Michigan rose by 9,000, and the labor force rose by 21,000 --- meaning that more people in our state are seeking employment.

That economic news is the continuation of a trend of positive job growth in Michigan. From June 2012 to June 2013, the number of unemployed in Michigan declined by 24,000. Meanwhile, the total employment in Michigan rose by 82,000 or 1.9 percent, since June 2012, which outpaced the national gain of 1.1 percent. And if you take a look at MiTalent.org, you'll see that there are more than 53,000 job openings in our state.

Because there's a growing work force, Michigan saw a slight uptick in unemployment last month. Despite 9,000 more employed workers, the unemployment rate increased slightly by three-tenths of a percentage point to 8.7 percent. Slightly higher unemployment all while more people

have jobs? How can that be?

It all comes down to how that number is calculated. And that has everything to do with something called "the work force."

When the statisticians at the U.S. Department of Labor measure unemployment, they start by measuring the work force. That includes all people who are employed and those who are unemployed and actively seeking work. It does NOT include those who are sitting on the sidelines -- not working, and not looking for a job. That means that if someone isn't working but isn't trying to find a job, they're not considered "unemployed" according to the statistics. But if they start looking for work again, they have re-joined the work force and are counted in the unemployment numbers.

The work force in Michigan is growing, though all those workers looking for jobs haven't yet landed one. They're trying to get back into the work force -- which is a good thing -- and it's a sign that there's growing confidence in Michigan's job market

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What should we tell our sons?

Last week's injustice to the life and legacy of Trayvon Martin takes its infamous place in the annals of United States history, along with the 1857 Dred Scott Supreme Court ruling, the 1896 Plessy v. Ferguson court ruling, the 1955 Emmett Till murder, and the 1963 fire hosing and church bombing of Black children in Birmingham, Ala., and the 2010 murder Oscar Grant while in handcuffs. Each was singular moment in American history, yet reminded the world of the unequal justice and "open season" on Black people in America. As was the question of Black families then, today, following the targeting of Trayvon, Black parents sense another "open season" and are asking: What should we tell our sons?

In an ideal America parents—of any color—should only tell their sons to be honest, hard working, faithful, fair, and respectful, among other virtues. Of course, the America in which we live, filled with the false notion of White supremacy, is a tale of two turnouts for boys whose names begin with the letter T. Imagine one is named Trevor. One is named Trayvon.

Trevor is White, blondeand haired blue-eyed. Trayvon is Black, brownhaired and brown-eyed. Both Trevor and Trayvon are typical teenage boys who are their proverbial "wings" in life. Both seemingly have much life in front of Both Trevor and Trayvon's parents love them dearly. Yet, when each exits their respective homes, the feelings of their parents are virtually in two different worlds. The White parents have no fear their son will be racially profiled. The Black parents knows that racial profiling of their son is a real and, perhaps, regular possibility. We know how Trayvon's life so violently ended.

Now that we have analyzed and been agitated to action by the acquittal of Trayvon's murderer, Black parents should tell their sons 0 things:

1.Dress like you wish to be treated. Police and "want-to-be" cops profile certain dress such as no belts, sagging pants, white tank tops etc. Although wearing a hoodie in

the rain, as Trayvon did, should be free from profiling.

2.Take driver's license photo with blazer, white shirt and tie (at least white shirt and tie), unless you choose cultural attire.

3. Give your name and ask their name, if asked for identification.

4.Be polite, without being pious; cordial, without being cowardly.

5.Pull over in nearest lighted area.

6. Turn on interior lights in car.

7.Place hands on top of steering wheel.

8. Announce intention to reach for wallet or identification.

9.Call Police immediately after traffic stop and identify location to ensure that there was an official stop recorded by Police dispatch.

10. Write detailed account of stop.

Moreover, we must teach our sons competence, courage, commitment, and compassion. We must teach them Black history. We must teach them past legal gains can be reversed if each generation does not remain vigilant. We must teach them that American economic downturns most often lead to a rise in racism against Black people. We must teach them not to feel entitled to anything. We must teach them that an empty intellect makes the most noise. We must teach them that ideas are intellectual currency. We must teach that comfort breeds complacency. We must teach them that injustice, like Italian Dressing, must be shaken. We must teach them that the garden of the mind must be cultivated for weeds. We must teach them that a liar is worst than a thief. We must teach them a good reputation is worth riches. We must teach them their aspirations should exceed their grasp. Lastly, we must teach our sons that we are the composite of all whose memory we cherish.

Trayvon's tragedy is marbled in our memory, and should inspire all conscientious Americans to sharpen our swords against injustice, wherever it may be, and to whomever it may be targeted.

Okay, I know that's weird. Welcome back Hostess, you were missed




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Detroit NAACP hold Nelson Mandela Day Celebration and Call to Action for Justice and Peace



reputation in tatters.

The reasons behind the riot, of course, are far thornier — socially, economically, racially than a mere raid on a gin joint. While Detroit in the mid-Sixties had a larger black middle class than most American cities its size - thanks in large part to strong unions, high employment and the thriving, all-powerful auto industry — it was hardly a model of racial harmony. (During World War II, for example, Detroit was the scene of an infamous race riot caused in large part by tensions between whites and blacks over jobs in auto plants that were churning tanks, planes and other war-related goods.) But the 1967 eruption, also known as the 12th Street riot, was remarkable not only for how long it lasted, but for the force that the city, state and federal authorities brought to bear in an




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

Staying Safe Online: Phishing

Online criminals are financially motivated to steal your information, whether or not they know who you are. They dress the part, talk the talk, and by pretending to be something or someone they're not, they try to get your personal details.

A phishing website or message tries to trick you into revealing personal information by appearing to be from a legitimate source, such as a bank, social network, or even Google. We're always informing our customers and the public to be on the lookout for phishing attempts, fake sites and Internet scams. Keeping your virus protection up to date will protect you and your computer from these malicious sites.

It's good to pay close attention to all sign-in screens online. You should always be wary of any message that asks for your personal information or messages that refer you to a web page asking for these details.

Messages or websites phishing for information might ask you to enter the following details:

- Usernames and passwords
- Social Security numbers
- Bank account numbers
- PINs (Personal Identification Numbers)
- · Full credit card numbers
- Your mother's maiden name
- Your birthday

Here are a few simple steps you can take to protect yourself against phishing:

1. Most importantly, never

reply to suspicious emails, tweets, or posts with your personal or financial information. Also, don't fill out forms or sign-in screens that link from these messages.

- 2. Never enter your password after following a link in an email or chat that you don't trust. It's better to go directly to the site using a trusted book-
- 3. Don't send your password via email.
- 4. Only sign in to your account when you're 100% sure you're on the real site. If you're not quite sure, check the Internet address in your web browser. For example, this is a fake www.goog.le.com<http://www. goog.le.com>
- 5. Install browser updates promptly, or choose a browser like Firefox or Chrome that updates automatically to the latest version. Many browsers will warn you if you try to go to a website that is suspected of phishing behavior. Google offers a Safe Browsing API which is used by Firefox, Safari and Chrome.
- 6. Most email providers, including Gmail, allow you to report suspicious emails and phishing scams. Reporting a message as phishing will prevent that user from sending you more emails, and our abuse team will use the report to help stop similar attacks.

Shedding extra pounds is rarely easy. Keeping it off is the bigger challenge. The more primitive regions of your brain have a magnetizing tendency to default back to old habits of consumption. How do you start on the right weight-loss track?

Choose your own lifestyle and include ideas from these healthy eating tips:

Eat at Home

Eat home-cooked meals at least five days a week. A Consumer Reports survey found this was a top habit of "successful losers." Sound daunting? Cooking may be easier than you think. Shortcut foods can make for quick meals, such as pre-chopped lean beef for fajitas, washed lettuce, pre-cut veggies, canned beans, cooked chicken strips, or grilled deli salmon.

Get Food Portions Right

The top habit of slim people is

to stick with modest food portions at every meal, five days a week or more. "Always slim" people do it and successful losers do it, too, according to a Consumer Reports survey. After measuring portions a few times, it can become automatic. Make it easier with small "snack" packs and by keeping serving dishes off the table at meal time.

Go Meatless More Often

Eating vegetarian meals more often is a slimming habit. Vegetarians tend to weigh less than meat eaters. While there are several reasons for this, legumes may play an important role. Bean burgers, lentil soup, and other tasty legume-based foods are simply packed with fiber. Most Americans get only half of this important nutrient, which fills you up with fewer calories.

Sip Smart: Cut Back on Sugar

Replace one sugary drink like regular soda with water or a zero-calorie seltzer and you'll avoid about 10 teaspoons of sugar. Add lemon, mint or frozen strawberries for flavor and fun.

The liquid sugar in soda appears to bypass the body's

normal fullness cues. One study compared an extra 450 calories per day from jelly beans vs. soda. The candy eaters unconsciously ate fewer calories overall, but not so the soda drinkers. They gained 2.5 pounds in four weeks.

Serve More, Eat More Veggies

Serve three vegetables with dinner tonight, instead of just one, and you'll eat more without really trying. Greater variety tricks people into eating more food — and eating more fruits and vegetables is a great way to lose weight. The high fiber and water content fills you up with fewer calories. Cook them without added fat. And season with lemon juice and herbs rather than drowning their goodness in high-fat sauces or dressings.

When Soup's On, Weight Comes Off

Add a broth-based soup to your day and you'll fill up on fewer calories. Think minestrone, tortilla soup, or Chinese wonton. Soup's especially handy at the beginning of a meal because it slows your eating and curbs your appetite. Start with a low-sodium broth or canned soup, add fresh or frozen vegetables and simmer. Beware of creamy soups, which can be high in fat and calories.

Go for Whole Grains

Whole grains such as brown rice, barley, oats, buckwheat, and whole wheat also belong in your stealthy weight loss strategy. They help fill you up with fewer calories and may improve your cholesterol profile, too. Whole grains are now in many products including waffles, pizza crust, English muffins, pasta, and soft "white" whole-wheat bread.

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
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

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


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The NBA's Free Agency Winners and Losers

He came out to play third base in the bottom of the inning, however, and seemed fine before leaving the field with trainer Kevin

Rand after Paul Konerko's one-out fly out to right field. The team tweeted that Cabrera was bothered by a sore left hip flexor. Don Kelly replaced him at third base. The team said Cabrera will be re-evaluated and likely is day to day. The day before on Sunday, Doug Fister pitched six effective innings, and Miguel Cabrera and Andy Dirks homered as the

Detroit Tigers beat the Kansas City Royals 4-1 on Sunday afternoon. The victory prevented the Tigers from being swept at Kauffman Stadium after losing the first two games by one run. Fister allowed one run, which came on a Miguel Tejada home run in the second, and six hits over six innings, while striking out five and walking one to pick up his eighth victory.

Fister threw 68 pitches in the first three innings. Leyland pulled him after 103 pitches. Drew Smyly, Bruce Rondon and Joaquin Benoit each pitched a scoreless inning after Fister departed. The Tigers will finish up with a afternoon game today before moving back home to Detroit's Comerica Park to play the Philadelphia Phillies tomorrow to start a ten game home stand.


