bers of the Romulus Community Methodist Church to sort and pack boxes of high quality food and distribute them to local families in need.



This approach has never let me down, and it has made all the difference in my life." I worry that those of us who march to the tune of Hip Hop are not reaching our fullest potential. Most people are waiting for an opportunity or a sign that the life that they are pursuing will amount to the time, effort and determination they have put in. But in the world of Hip Hop, it seems you need someone to validate you in order to be successful.

"I don't understand how he can rep Compton if he never came outside and experienced what was going on. I guess when you get money you can be whoever you want to be. People died behind this sh.., there are rules and regulations that govern the hood. Now a n....a comes to the hood and gets validated by throwing some money around and everybody forgets the GOOD Kid was peaking out the window at our MADD

I've always wondered with all the aspiring artists in the world, do we hear the greatest lyrics from the greatest rapper? We have to admit the Hip Hop game is lopsided when it comes to choosing who will reach the masses. At this point, it's a needle in a haystack gamble to breaking through, unless you are ushered in by one of the mainstream acts. An industry that used to take so many chances on creativity has flat lined into a one size fits all approach.

My concern is no one has told the millions of loyal Hip Hop followers that you need to connect with one of the influencers, most of whom are not interested in opening the doors for the next best thing. Everybody who has made it seems to be focused on longevity – theirs. And if they introduce someone who is stronger, more lyrical, more authentic than they are, we might hear them reciting a Kendrick Lamar chorus "B..., Don't Kill My Vibe, B.... Don't Kill My Vibe!"

So where does that leave the future generations of Hip Hop? Forbes recently released its Cash Kings list of highest grossing Hip Hop artists of 2013. The top 20 artists made from \$6 million to \$50 million, which proves there is money to be made in Hip Hop. But the question is: How?

Many of the artist on the list have endorsement deals, products and tour to get the bulk of their money. Many of the artists are also veterans and have connected to the newer members on the roster, essentially helping their protege's boost their brands and sales. What gets lost in translation is how someone who has not attained this type of success gets to that. Is it the luck of the draw? Is it talent? Is it who you know? Is it the Illuminati myth that most of the current Cash Kings throw up in their videos and pictures?

What do we tell our young people who believe in themselves, who believe in their music, who believe in Hip Hop? Do we tell them to do an about face and dream another dream? Vanity Fair's November issue features a cover story on Jay Z. It details how he feels his life as a drug dealer is a catalyst for his ability to become a sports agent. According to Jay selling drugs taught him budgeting and he was able to transfer these skills into his business dynasty of today.



medical marijuana patient under Michigan's Medical Marihuana Act (MMMA). Despite this, Dearborn Police Officer David Lacey issued a marijuana possession ticket, a police video revealed, to Jones because she failed to disclose her HIV-positive status to him prior to a search of her car during an August 2012 traffic stop. Legal experts agree, Jones was not obligated to disclose her status to the officer.

The incident made national headlines in September 2012 The American Independent News Network obtained the video. In the recording, the officer can be heard telling Jones "Honestly, if it wasn't for [your HIV status], I don't think I would have wrote anybody for anything. But that kind of really aggravated me, you know what I mean? You got to tell me right away, 'I've got this. I've got that.' 'Cause at that time, I wasn't wearing any gloves."

The city pursued criminal charges against Jones despite her proof of defense under Section 8 of the MMMA. Lawyers involved in the case said the city offered to dismiss the case if Jones would waive her right to sue the city for violating her civil rights.

"This is probably the longest case I've been involved in," said Paul Spaniolo, one of two attorneys who handled the case. "[Jones] followed the law to the 't.' She couldn't have followed it any better."

The case involved more than 10 hearings, including an appeal to the Circuit Court on the MMMA defenses, which a District judge originally refused to acknowledge.

Joshua Moore of Detroit Legal Services is also representing Jones and he says his client will file a civil action against the city for violating her civil rights.

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Magnificent Man: William Earl Amis

What do you think of when you think of a soldier? I think of a warrior or fighter. I think of courage, commitment and conviction. What do you think when you hear the term: Buffalo Soldier?

Those who know history, know. Our younger generation may not be so familiar with the term and what it means to the history of our nation. Buffalo Soldier is a term used for African-American calvalrymen.

From 1776-1781, Congress agreed to enlist colored men into the armed services. They let them serve, but they were segregated. At the time, to many blacks, the Buffalo Soldiers werea a symbol of hope for a better future.

Buffalo Soldiers protected the American frontier from the American Revolution through the Indian Wars. They also served in the Spanish-American War, Mexican Expedition, the Cuban Crisis, Philippine insurrection, both World Wars, and the Korean Conflict. They trained officers at West Point. They built frontier forts, constructed telegraph lines, patrolled the Mexican border and captured thieves and outlaw gangs. The last chapter ended with World War II and were never formally recognized until 1992 when a bronze statue was erected in Kansas, commissioned by General Colin Powell.

We are happy to honor a legendary, actual and factual Buffalo Soldier: Mr. William Amis Sr. (Leatherneck 2). He is affectionately called the happiest man in the world. He was born March 22, 1936 in Boston, Massachusetts.

After high school, Bill, as he is well known, spent 21 years active duty in the Marine Corp. and 8 years in the Fleet Marine Force. During his years in the Marines he had a variety of MOS jobs including Aviation Mechanic, combat Engineer and more. He was also selected to join the Mounted Color Guard, he was the first black marine to hold the position.

Bill has traveled around the world. He retired in 1974. moved to Michigan, he worked with Inkster Police Department and the Inkster Schools System. In 1983 he married Ann Rooks. In 1986, Bill retired from Inkster, joined the Federal Police Department (DOD). This job enabled him to meet many high profile people. He was the oldest person in the country to be on the Swat Team.

In 2002, Bill retired from the government. In 2003, he road to Atlanta with a group of bikers, saw the Buffalo Soldiers from Chicago and this group impressed him. He began to do his research. Contacted Dream Maker and

the ball started to roll. By the end of the year Bill had everything in order. He met with two friends, Gordon (G-Man) and Farra (Brown Sugar) Mattingly to let them know he was going to organize a Buffalo Soldiers' Chapter in Michigan.

In February 2004, the group traveled to Houston, Texas to meet with the National members of the Buffalo Soldiers' Club. Bill was accepted into the club. After leaving Texas, Bill, Ann, Gordon and Farra begin working on By-laws and forming a Charter. He contacted four guys that had bikes and love riding. They were Calvin (Honey Bear) Smith, Lee (Black Hawk) Crump, Billy (Choctaw Bill) Lewis and James So -Sweet) Malone. Each man brought their wives to form a club. These men were his Charter Members.

The first meeting was held on Sunday, April 4, 2004 in Bill's home. Bill, along with his members have done great things for the commu-

nity, churches, hospitals, schools and nursing homes. During the month of February, Bill spends time speaking to children and adults, telling the history of the Buffalo Soldiers. Each year the club has given scholarship to high school graduates. Schools were adopted and gifts given out to children.

Bill helped organize chapters in Canada, Kansas, Ohio and Flint, Michigan. Being a part of the Buffalo Soldiers has being the high light of his

In November, 2010, Bill step down from president. Michael Varner, (Sledge) who became the president of Michigan Buffalo Soldiers.

Bill lives in Oak Park, Michigan with his wife. He has three children and five grandchildren. He and Ann look forward to traveling and passing on the history of the Buffalo Soldiers.

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


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No Amount of Drinking is Safe **During Pregnancy**

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Each year, nearly 40,000 babies are born with Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorders (FASDs), according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention. The disorders are caused by mothers'

FASDs have serious physipsychological and developmental conditions

alcohol consumption during

pregnancy and range in severity. Some infants with the most severe form of





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that continue into adulthood.

Leigh Tenkku, associate research professor in the School of Social Work at the University of Missouri -Columbia and director of the Midwest Regional Fetal Alcohol Symptom Training Center, says no amount and no type of alcohol is safe for women to drink during pregnancy.

"Women should not drink alcohol if they are pregnant and, especially, if they are thinking about becoming pregnant," Tenkku said. "Women do not find out they are pregnant for up to six to eight weeks into their pregnancies, and the most damaging effects of alcohol on the fetus occur within those first weeks of life."

FASDs, like autism spectrum disorders, occur on a spectrum of severity and do not improve over time. However, unlike other birth defects or developmental disorders, FASDs easily can be prevented.

"Of all known birth defects, FASDs are 100-percent preventable if moms refrain drinking alcohol," Tenkku said.

"Medical professionals should support no alcohol during pregnancy should counsel women who are considering becoming pregnant to not drink when they are trying to conceive."

Tenkku is the director for research and director of the doctoral program for the School of Social Work, which is part of the MU College of Human Environmental Sciences. She has received more than \$1 million from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention to support her ongoing work as director of the Midwest Regional Fetal Alcohol Symptom Training Center.

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


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



Dearborn Heights Robichaud senior and wide receiver Dewey Mitchell was crowned Homecoming King at the game between the Bulldogs and the Romulus Eagles on October 4, 2013

Take two teams with middle of the pack records in their league and two tough defenses and what do you get?

Apparently, a shootout.

Well, not quite. But this year's homecoming game at Dearborn Heights Robichaud—with the Bulldogs facing off against new natural rival Romulus—featured enough firepower to keep the crowd hype.

And the host Bulldogs stormed back from an 11-point deficit and pulled off the victory, 24-23, to satisfy their homecoming faithful.

Robichaud coach Al Demps lauded his team's play.

"It came down to our boys just digging deep and wanting it more," he said. "Our defense played outstanding and our offense finally got clicking, and we were able to start running the ball more." Robichaud grabbed the 24-23 lead late into the third quarter, when Shaquille Martin hit Aaron Thompson on a 22yard pass, capping off a drive set up by a Romulus fumble recovered by the Bulldogs. With 2:27 left in the game and facing third-and-18, Romulus quarterback Jalen Tatumwho replaced Matt Eldridge in the second quarter—went for broke on a pass. But an interception by Robichaud linebacker Malik Johnson and a facemask penalty Romulus ended the drive.

The Eagles forced Robichaud into a four-and-out with 1:03 left, but Malachi Minion's interception clinched the victory for the Bulldogs.

There were still plenty of great defensive plays as well, including sacks, stops for losses, a safety and turnovers—plenty of them. The two teams accounted for six turnovers (three fumbles, three interceptions)—five of them coming from Romulus.

"We were too sloppy today," Romulus coach Thom Patterson said. "Penalties and turnovers shot us in the foot. Lack of discipline has been our problem."

Romulus jumped on the board first when Dion Stewart recovered a fumble in the Robichaud endzone. Matt Eldridge ran in the two-point to make the game 8-0, but then left the game. Tatum replaced him for the remainder of the contest.

"We had a couple of key injuries," Patterson said. "Eldridge left the game, and our No. 1 D-Lineman (Immanuel Stinson) was out for two-thirds of the game. Tatum's only a freshman."

But Robichaud answered when Martin connected with Thompson on a 39-yard play. That play, coupled with a 15-yard roughing-the-passer penalty on Romulus, put the Bulldogs in position to score—which Martin did on a 22-yard run. The two-point was not good to make the score 8-6.

Big plays set up scoring chances all night, as Mike Hall's 72-yard kick return set up a two-yard run by Leroy Rutherford to give the Eagles a 15-6 lead.

Robichaud answered in kind, when a 61-yard return by Travell Naylor set up a 24-yard touchdown pass from Martin to Lamar Calvin, drawing the Bulldogs within 15-12. And all of this occurred in the first quarter.

Romulus extended their lead to 17-12 when Stinson sacked Martin in the end zone for a safety, and widened it to 23-12 at the beginning of the third when Hall took a kickoff 80-yards for a touchdown.

But the Bulldogs refused to let down their hometown faithful, as they began to storm back. Martin ran for a 13-yard touchdown, and the Bulldogs recovered another fumble to set up their game-winning touchdown.

Martin totaled 109 yards on 6-of-14 passing, and also rushed for 65 yards while accounting for four total touchdowns. Jalen Walker added 107 yards on the ground.

Defensively, Minion paced the Bulldogs with 12 total tackles, two tackles for losses and his interception. Malik Johnson added seven tackles, two forced fumbles, and his interception. The Bulldogs will host Dearborn Heights Annapolis on Friday at 7 p.m.

The Tigers are a team built to win or at least play for championships, not merely make the playoffs. Maybe seven years ago that was good enough, however, with nearly \$150 million invested in the lineup, simply playing in four or five playoff games isn't good enough. Not when teams like Oakland, Tampa Bay and Pittsburgh are doing with significantly smaller payrolls. Nevertheless, Brandon Moss, Josh Reddick and Seth Smith homered for the Athletics, who chased Anibal Sanchez in the fifth inning Monday and defeated the Tigers 6-3 for a 2-1 AL Division Series lead. Coco Crisp's single to start the third, Josh Donaldson walked. Jed Lowrie and Moss both struck out, and it looked like Sanchez might get out of the inning when Yoenis Cespedes hit a sharp grounder to Miguel Cabrera. The slugging third baseman couldn't come up

with the ball and couldn't keep it in the infield, and the error allowed the A's to take the lead. Moss broke a 3-all tie in the fifth with a solo shot, and Smith's two-run drive later in the inning ended Sanchez's day. It was an impressive offensive show after the teams split two tense, low scoring games in Oakland. The A's can close out the series Tuesday and reach the AL Championship Series for the first time since 2006 -when the Tigers swept them. Now, on this past Tuesday, Oakland sended rookie Dan Starkly to the mound against Detroit's Doug Fister. However, Max Scherzer, making his first relief appearance since the 2011 postseason, had already given up a run in the seventh. With the Tigers ahead 5-4, thanks to an Austin Jackson single in the bottom of the seventh inning. Jackson who was 1 for 14 with 10 strikeouts in the series

to that point -- managed a broken-bat single to put the ahead Nevertheless, Max allowed a walk and a double to start the eighth, but after an intentional walk to load the bases, manager Jim Leyland left his 21game winner on the mound. Scherzer struck out Josh Reddick and Stephen Vogt before getting pinch-hitter Alberto Callaspo to line out to center. Tigers rallied past the Oakland Athletics 8-6 on Tuesday to force a decisive fifth game in their AL Division Series. The Detroit Lions return to action this weekend with a Week 6 road matchup against the Cleveland Browns on Sunday afternoon with kickoff set for 1 PM ET. The Lions will be looking to bounce back after falling to the Green Bay Packers 22-9 in Week 5, while the Browns look to extend their three-game winning streak after a 42-37 victory over the Buffalo Bills. In 2010, QB Matthew Stafford led the Lions to a come-frombehind 38-37 win over Cleveland (11/22) with one of the most remarkable performances by a rookie QB in NFL history. Stafford brought the Lions back from deficits three different times (21, 3 and 6 points) to either tie or take the lead. The win was Stafford's first career come-from-behind fourth-quarter win. Detroit Lions Head Coach Jim Schwartz said to the media this past Monday on what more the team could have done offensively to make up for the loss of wide receiver Calvin Johnson: "It's all about execution. I think we had some opportunities. I think you really look at that game; it was 6-0 at the end of the second quarter. We were backed up pretty good. We didn't want to go three and out real quickly, but we got a couple first downs, we were able to get into a two-minute drive, really effectively move the ball. Matt (Stafford) scrambled for a first down and we had a 1st-and-10, I don't think it was a 1st-and-goal, but it was a 1st-and-10 opportunity that was called back with a holding and that became a 3rdand-15 or whatever it was. And we didn't get it and we ended up with a field goal. And even though we went in only 6-3 at the half, that certainly would have been a big change, being 7-6 right there. We took a lot of negative plays and when we've played well on offense, we haven't taken those negative plays. Obviously the five sacks, but also a couple loss yardage runs and a few more penalties than we've had on offense. Offense has really done a good job of eliminating penalties and I think all of those put us in some tough situations. When you're playing a good defense, you're on the road, those are situations you want to stay out of and we could certainly do those things. Reducing Air Conditioner and Car Battery Thefts



The City of Ecorse has experienced an upward trend of Central Air Unit and Car Battery thefts.

Even though the Ecorse Police Department has made several arrests, we would like the citizens and the community at large to assist us in curbing this trend. Below I have listed a few proven methods of deterring would be thieves and protecting your property.

1. Purchase an Air Conditioner Cage: One basic but very effective method to safeguard your

unit is to buy a specifically designed cage for it. They are the most effective deterrent because of their immediate visibility.

2. Purchase and Air Conditioner alarm: The alarm may be a little

more expensive yet less visible than a cage. Even if you don't purchase the alarm, you may be able to purchase an alarm sticker to warn thieves that the premises is protected by an alarm system

3. Surveillance Cameras or Motion Sensor Lights: Some alarm systems

provide cameras that can also be motion activated. This along with motion activated security lights would be a big deterrent, the motion sensor lights should be aimed in the area that needs protection.

4. Air Conditioner Tracking Device: One "Hi-Tech" method is to

install a tracker in the unit which notifies the police is the unit is moved and tracks its location.

A person could even stencil "This Unit Is Stolen" on the inside of the housing where thieves can see it, the stencil could even include the address and the phrase "Notify Police".

As far as the battery thefts go, the biggest problem we have believe it or not is that many people don't lock their car doors! Once inside of the vehicle not only do thieves take whatever belongings they find inside of the vehicle, they pop the hood and remove the battery.

These are only a few suggestions among many that could prevent you from becoming a victim of theft.

Wayne County Jails report for Tuesday, October 08, 2013

The Wayne County Sheriffs Office has been chronically underfunded for its basic mandated function of operating the jails. The budget allocates funding to house 1,776 inmates per day at the three Wayne County jails, a number set by a Wayne County Circuit Court consent order. But, in fact, the Sheriffs

Office is required to provide oversight of approximately 1,000 additional inmates per day - 500 that are

incarcerated in the jails and 500 that are monitored on tether, creating a deficit of mill ions of dollars.

Using audited financial data,

the county Auditor General determined the cost per diem to house an offender at about \$144 per day. To help reduce costs, the sheriff operates an electronic monitoring (tether) unit that the Auditor General calls one of the largest and

most successful tether programs in the United States. It keeps hundreds of offenders out of the jails at a per person cost of about \$23 per day, saving more than \$20 million a year, based on Auditor General estimates.

Why are the Michigan State Police in our city? From all accounts they are helping to restore a sense of safety and calm in Inkster. Lt. Hendricks from the Michigan State Police (MSP) said in the Inkster Council meeting on Monday that they have been in the city for about a year. The MSP are there to have an added presence since the budget cuts have forced the Inkster police department to be substantially reduced. During the time in Inkster, they have made 651 traffic stops however only 67 of the stops resulted in tickets being issued. The remaining of the stops resulted in warnings. Not only are they helping in the area of traffic enforcement, they also have four detectives helping on open homicides.

Chief Napoleon said, "We realize that the city officials have to make the hard decisions to what we can to prevent and Emergency Manager from being assigned to our City. My responsibility as chief is to make sure our citizens are safe. To help make this possible, we have requested help from the Michigan State Police, the Wayne County Sheriff depart-

ment, the U.S. Marshalls and the citizens. We want to make sure when a citizen call the police – they get police." Mayor Hampton said, "We can't do it alone. We realize that it is going to take partnership and collaborations in order to help stabilize our city. This is just one that is working in our city. We feel their presence in the community and we thank the Governor Snyder for approving this type of program." This program started last year when four Michigan cities were listed on the worst cities list in the country.

May Have Thought President Obama was Stalking Her



More info about Miriam Carey; the woman who led law enforcement authorities on a chase from the White House to the Capitol before she was killed, is coming out.

It's now believed that she may have thought that President Obama was stalk-

ing her, law enforcement sources told NBC News. The sources said that Carey, had a history of mental health problems.

The chase, on Thursday afternoon, stirred panic in the capital and briefly stopped the mechanisms of government. It happened

two weeks after a man shot 12 people to death at the Washington Navy Yard.

Members of the House and Senate, in a standoff over the government shutdown, were ordered to stay in place. One lawmaker was cut off mid-sentence during a speech. A swarm of police startled tourists who were taking in Washington on a summery day.

Carey, 34, was a dental hygienist living in Stamford, Conn. Details of her background began to emerge in the hours after the episode. Dr. Barry Weiss, a dentist, told NBC Connecticut that Carey was working for him in January 2012 when she suffered a fall and missed two to three weeks. He said that she appeared increasingly stressed after an unplanned pregnancy. Relatives have said that she may have suffered postpartum depres-

Weiss said that he fired her in August 2012 after patients complained that she was too rough.

She occasionally forgets things here and there, but never anything that could cause harm to herself or anyone else. Still, I have a problem with the fact that she insists on driving. My mother is very independent. She lives in her own apartment and does her own grocery shopping and gets herself to appointments; but it scares me to know that she's on the road during peak hours of the day. We do dinner together at least once a week, and of course, she drives. I am on edge the entire time! She weaves in and out of traffic and lays on the gas like a green light never turns red. But it does, so then she has to SLAM on the brake to avoid going through it. When I ask her to slow down and to be more careful, her answer is always the same, "I've been driving longer than you! I ain't never had an accident and I only got 2 tickets my whole life!" She's right. But I'm nervous anyway. With all these people on the road, talking and texting on their phones, I'm just scared for her safety. I am retired and

am able to take my mother from place to place but she refuses. What can I do?

Dear WANTING,

can let your mother have her independence and drive all over the country if she wants to. I get your concern. But your issue isn't just about your mother driving; you're worried about other people on the road driving with her. That part you can't change. Today, there are more drivers on the road, more dangerous drivers, than there was when your mother began driving. Technology is largely to blame for the attention deficit we see on the highways now. Texting and talking on the phone is responsible for many accidents, a large number of them being fatal. But that still doesn't give you a reason to revoke your mom's license. She has a near perfect record; there's no cause for her driving privileges to be taken from her. If your mother chooses to help ease your mind, she could take a driving test when the time to renew her license approaches. Until then, it may be helpful for you to read over some information on how to recognize potential warning signs in seniors to alert you and let you know when it may be time to hang the keys up. The DMV has some guidelines that the two of you can review together. I don't think "lead-foot" is going to carry your case very far. Let her drive-it gives her pride to be independent and it lets you off the hook from having to chauffeur her from place to place. Good luck to you both. Ayana
