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

Obama Praises Mandela as 'Great Liberator'

SOWETO, South Africa (NNPA) – President Barack Obama described Nelson Mandela, South Africa's first Black elected president, as "the last great liberator of the 20th century" and thanked the grieving nation for sharing their beloved former leader with the rest of the world.

Speaking Tuesday at a rainsoaked memorial service here attended by nearly 100 current and former international leaders, Obama said, "It is a singular honor to be with you today, to celebrate a life like no other. To the people of South Africa, people of every race and walk of life the world thanks you for sharing Nelson Mandela with us. His struggle was your struggle. His triumph was your triumph. Your dignity and your hope found expression in his life. And your freedom, your democracy is his cherished legacy."

Mandela died last Thursday at the age of 95 after a long illness. The memorial service kicked off a week of celebrations that will culminate Sunday with his burial in his ancestral village of Qunu, in the Eastern Cape region. Flags are flying throughout the country at half-staff.

Coincidentally, the memorial service fell on United Nations Human Rights Day. Obama used the occasion to deliver stern words to leaders who repress their own people yet profess to admire Mandela, whom Obama mostly referred to as Madiba, the former president's Xhosa tribal name.

"There are too many people happily who embrace Madiba's legacy of racial reconciliation, but passionately resist even modest reforms that would challenge chronic poverty and growing inequality," President Obama said. "There are too many leaders who claim solidarity with Madiba's struggle for freedom, but do not tolerate dissent from their own people. And there are too many of us on the sidelines, comfortable in complacency or cynicism when our voices must be heard."

Like many U.S. civil rights leaders, Obama drew a parallel between Mandela's struggle for majority rule in South Africa and African-Americans' struggle to overcome slavery and Jim Crow laws that treated Blacks as second-class citizens.

"We know that, like South Africa, the United States had to overcome centuries of racial subjugation. As was true here, it took sacrifice the sacrifice of countless people, known and unknown, to see the dawn of a new day. Michelle and I are beneficiaries of that struggle," Obama said to applause. "But in America, and in South Africa, and in countries all around the globe, we cannot allow our progress to cloud the fact that our work is not yet done."

Mandela, a former amateur boxer, gave his last public speech in the soccer stadium where the tribute was held. Fittingly, the stadium is located in Soweto, a township were Blacks were forced to live under apartheid and where Mandela and Bishop Desmond Tutu have homes.

Accompanying Obama on Air Force One were former president George W. Bush and his wife, Laura, and former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton. Former presidents Bill Clinton and Jimmy Carter arrived in South Africa on separate aircrafts.

Like many international gatherings, journalists observe every detail, including whether adversaries shake hands.

Obama and Cuban President Raul Castro shook hands but, White House officials were quick to note that it amounted to nothing more than an exchange of pleasantries.

"Nothing was planned in

terms of the president's role other than his remarks," Deputy National Security Adviser Ben Rhodes told reporters traveling with Obama. "He really didn't do more than exchange greetings with those leaders on his way to speak, it wasn't a substantive discussion."

The fact that Obama and Castro were at the same event demonstrated the breath of Mandela's impact on their world.

"He was more than one of the greatest leaders of our time. He was one of our greatest teachers," U.N. Secretary General Ban Ki-moon told those in attendance. "His baobab tree has left deep roots that reach across the planet."

Following in the footsteps of Mandela is a tough act to follow, as South African President Jacob Zuma has already discovered. He and the ruling ANC Party are unpopular because of a poor economy and record economic inequality. When Zuma rose to give the keynote speech Tuesday, he was widely booed. Some gave the thumbs down sign or rolled their wrists, a soccer gesture for substitution.

"There is no one like Madiba. He was one of a kind," Zuma said, as the booing subsided. "Mandela believed in collective leadership. He never wanted to be viewed as a messiah or a saint. He recognized that all of his achievements were a result of working with the A.N.C. collective."

President Obama relayed how Mandela's fight for freedom impacted him personally.

"Over 30 years ago, while still a student, I learned of Mandela and the struggles in this land. It stirred something in me. It woke me up to my responsibilities — to others, and to myself — and set me on an improbable journey that finds me here today. And while I will always fall short of Madiba's example, he makes me want to be better. He speaks to what is best inside us."

Gen. Thanduxolo Mandela, a relative who offered one of the eulogies, said: "I am sure Madiba is smiling from above as he looks down at the multitude of diversity gathered here, for this is what he strove for – the equality of man, the brotherhood of humanity."

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Fantasy sports scores with mobile and online users

When it comes to defining that which is "typically American," I think we're going to have to add "sports" to the old expression, "As American as Mom and apple pie." We are a country full of sports fanatics. (While I might not exactly fall into that category, I am the mother of an extraordinary 17-year-old athlete and lover of all things sports. So, I have to admit, that I need to step up and try to keep up)! Nielsen numbers bear this out. Sports programs are among the top watched in African-American households as well as those of the general population, with the Super Bowl consistently ranking as the most-watched program across the board. In fact, Super Bowl XLVII drew 108 million viewers nationally. African - Americans made up a whopping 12.5 million of those viewers. (Personally, I enjoy the parties and the commercials, the game? Not so much.)

With football and basketball season in full swing, Nielsen has identified and measured a phenomenal, growing niche industry, Fantasy Sports. Now, for those of you who, like me, were not familiar with this popular trend - Fantasy Leagues are places where you can use the web, smartphones and/or tablets, act as sports general managers, to draft professional athletes from your favorite pro teams to make up the roster how you see it in your own personal league. Fantasy points are awarded to the players, based on their performance in the actual games being played. You and your friends can compete or bet against each other while watching the real game. While you can organize a fantasy team in any sport, football is the most popular, with more than 10 million Americans using fantasy football apps on their smartphones.

So, who's playing all of these Fantasy Sports? African-Americans are the second largest group who engage in this cultural phenomenon and make up 12% of fantasy sports players. And, there's no shocker here, but 67% of fantasy players are male, which accounts for most of those who participate in fantasy sports. The average fantasy player is between the ages of 25-34. But, hold on fellas! What was a surprise to me, though, is that so many women are getting in on the action. Our insights

show that 32% of adult fantasy sports players online are female. That's every man's dream, right? A woman who loves her sports.

And of course, advertisers are hip to this trend as well. In 2012, \$13.3 billion was spent on sporting event programming all in an effort to capture the eyes and win the hearts of fantasy sports players.

Fantasy sports players are:

- 12% more likely to have children
- More likely to earn \$50,000 \$75,000 a year
- 84% more likely than the average U.S. adult to buy movie tickets online
- 67% more likely to purchase credit cards online
- 66% more likely to purchase insurance online
- 60% more likely to purchase home electronics online
- 58% more likely to purchase event tickets online

So, how is all of this fantasy playing going on? According to research, more than 87 million Americans visited sports websites from April-June this year. In addition, 36 million smartphone owners use sports apps. Fantasy football apps are by far the most popular of the fantasy sports apps, with more than 10 million Americans using them and that number is up 15 percent from last year. The two most popular football apps used are Yahoo! and ESPN, with about 5 million users each during a one month period in 2013. That period also showed that fantasy players spend an average of two hours and 14 minutes per person using these apps. And, the average person opened these apps 27 times. That's some serious dedication!

So with all these insights on fantasy sports, it shows that Americans are die hard sports fans. I mean truly die hard. But, even though it's "fantasy" remember you are still flexing your consumer muscles. You have the power to choose, so make those picks wisely and strategically. That's one bit of advice that I can offer. Good luck with your teams!

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



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

The Medical Care Insurance Can't Pay For

For many years, my brick house in Jamaica, Queens, doubled as my office. My garage served as an entrance to my office, which was in the basement. I had two examining rooms, a consultation

room and a small waiting area that could seat about 10 people. I played music all day long. In the office, I had a turntable, and in addition to being a doctor, I was also a deejay. I would put on gospel and jazz tunes and occasionally play speeches by Malcolm X, Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. and even recordings of poems by Langston Hughes recited by the great poet himself. My patients enjoyed jazz as well as gospel.

Coming to my office was more like coming to a social meeting. It wasn't unusual to have a group in one corner talking about politics and a group in another talking about music and another group talking about their families. Invariably, someone would yell out, "Hey Doc, what was that record you played?"

My music was very important in my office; it was part of the healing agent. I created an atmosphere that made people feel better instantly, from music to my wife's welcoming smile. She was my main receptionist. I would also hire girls from the neighborhood to come in to help after school until about 8 or 9 at night. I gave about 30 young ladies

their start in the workforce through the office. Most of them are now doctors, nurses, judges and teachers. They all went on to do something.


My practice was also a family business that employed my daughter and my two sons in addition to my wife. My daughter often was the receptionist, and my sons would clean up the office for the next day. They were the third arm that I needed to complete my work, and I appreciated it.

From the waiting room, you could smell my wife's cooking. Sometimes in the winter, when she would cook her famous chicken soup, I would go upstairs and get a cup of it for a patient who was waiting in the examining room. I also made sure we always had coffee and tea in the waiting room.

Although patients had to wait for long periods, no one minded the wait, even if it was a few hours. I didn't just rush patients in and out. After I examined them, I would talk to them mostly about their families and their lives. I cared about each patient as a person; they weren't just sick bodies that needed medical attention—they also needed soul healing.

New book: "The Struggle Is My Life"



A new book by the imprisoned leader of South Africa's anti-apartheid movement, Nelson Mandela, was published in New York on June 14, the date of mass rallies against South Africa's white minority government. Mandela's book, entitled The Struggle is My Life, is being published by Pathfinerd Press, which also publishes books by Fidel Castro, Malcolm X and leaders of the Sandinista revolution in Nicarag

The book brings together speeches and writings by Mandela spanning more than 40 years in his activity in the African National

Congress (ANC), the major organizational fighting for the end of apartheid rule in South Africa. Mandela's courtroom testimony in the 1964 trial at which he was sentenced to life imprisonment is also included. A special supplement contains accounts of Mandela in prison by his fellow prisoners.

Among the most recent material is Mandela's reply to South African President P. W. Botha's 1985 offer to release Mandela if the ANC leader "unconditionally rejected violence as a political weapon." In his reply, read by his daughter Zinzi to a mass meeting in Soweto, near Johannesburg, Mandela said: "Let him (Botha) renounce violence. Let him say that he will dismantle apartheid. Let him unban the people's organization, the African National Congress. Let him free all who have been imprisoned, banished or exiled for their opposition to apartheid. Let him guarantee free political activity so that people may decide who will govern them.

"But I cannot sell my birthright, nor am I prepared to sell the birthright of the people to be free....
"Only free men can negotiate. Prisoners cannot containing containing and will not give

"Only free men can negotiate. Prisoners cannot enter into contracts... I cannot and will not give any undertaking at a time when I and you, the people, are not free.

"Your freedom and mine cannot be separated. I will return"

Mandela remains imprisoned at the Pollsmoor maximum security prison near Capt Town, despite the growing movement in South Africa and throughout the world demanding his release.

Holiday Green Cleaning Tips



With all of the hustle and bustle of the holidays it can be difficult to remain green conscious. Thanks to our friends and Recyclebank, here are a few green cleaning tips for the holiday season that will help you keep Westland a greener place to live, work and play.

Sweep instead of vacuum. Save a little bit of energy by pulling out the broom instead of the vacuum to get your floors clean. A broom is much easier to use than a heavy vacuum and it will get into those nooks and crannies clean that your vacuum might not be able to reach.

Use white vinegar for just about everything. Use it fullstrength or mixed with water to wipe down counters and appliances (it cuts the grease). Mix with hot water and add a few drops of mineral oil to mop wooden floors or clean wooden cabinets. Mix it with water and put it in a spray bottle to clean mirrors and glass windows, and use wads of old newspaper to wipe it clean. If you don't like the smell of vinegar, don't worry. The odor dissipates as it dries.

Polish silver naturally. Vinegar mixed together with a few tablespoons of baking soda will clean your silver just as well as a chemical silver polish. Soak it for a few hours, then rinse it off and dry with a soft, clean cloth.

Degrease dishes with baking soda. Mix baking soda with water in to clean greasy pans or make a baking soda and water solution in the sink to soak dishes. After a 15-minute soak, they'll be easier to clean.

Create a dishwashing station at your sink. Once you've packed your dishwasher full, use the proper technique to wash the rest of your dishes: Fill one side of your sink with hot, sudsy water, and the other with cool, clean water. Scrape off as much food as possible, then scrub the dishes in the hot water, and dip them in the cold water to rinse. Using this method will help save a lot of water and dish soap. Hint: wait to run your dishwasher until you go to bed, as the energy costs are lower. Turn off the heat dry setting so the dishes airdry on their own to conserve energy.



Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom

Idris Is Impressive in Inspirational Adaptation of Late Icon's Autobiography

Nelson "Madiba" Mandela (Idris Elba) started secretly writing his autobiography "Long Walk to Freedom" while still serving what he had every reason to believe might very well be a life sentence on Robben Island. The lawyerturned-spokesman for the out-African National lawed Congress had been convicted of treason for trying to disman-South Africa's racist regime.

But he was indeed freed following 27 years in prison of imprisonment when the bloody civil war was on the brink of bringing an end to Apartheid. At that point, Mandela assured the apprehensive white minority that despite the fact that, "Fear has made you an unjust and brutal people, when we come to power, there will be no revenge."


Soon thereafter, he was democratically elected the nation's first black president, assuming the reigns of power in 1994. And that transition to majority rule did prove to be smooth, with the help of pardons for crimes against humanity being granted by the Truth and Reconciliation Commission to guilty parties from both sides of the conflict.

Directed by Justin Chadwick, Mandela: Long Walk to Freedom is an epic biopic chronicling the rise, incarceration and ultimate redemption of the recently-deceased political icon. Versatile British actor Idris Elba exhibits the requisite combination of outrage, dignity, empathy and steely resolve needed to portray the late leader convincingly.
