Protecting the wild birds of Cyprus, their habitats, and wider biodiversity, through monitoring, conservation and education actions, and by developing people's appreciation of nature.



Campaign against illegal Bird Trappping

- Industrial scale
- 155 different species of birds found trapped on mistnets and limesticks
- Over 2 million birds could have been killed in Cyprus in autumn 2015 based on our latest report
- BirdLife Cyprus is working for a 'zero tolerance' approach

Barn owl projects

The main objective of the project in Cyprus, is to use Barn Owls as pest controllers of rodents by placing nest boxes in certain sites in order to minimise rodenticide use. (2015-16 & 2018-19)




Apus pallidus 10km x 10km Breeding Distribution






Apus apus 10km x 10km Breeding Range

- Arrive in March (usually with some first records in February)
- Leave by late July
- Passage birds until September (even October)











The most up-to-date population estimates (Article 12 reporting in 2012) for Cyprus are:

- Common Swift 15,000-60,000 pairs (uncertain trend)
- Alpine Swift 200-500 pairs (trend unknown)
- Pallid Swift 200-1,000 pairs (trend unknown)










Common Swift

Trend Evaluation 2006 - 2016: Uncertain trend (data from 103 sites)












Common Swift

Aim of the project:


- Establish foundations for am awareness raising program




