

Our Programs

Academic Achievement and Cultural Enrichment (A.A.C.E.)

An intensive, accelerated program which provides enriched academic and cultural activities for academically-advanced minority students, and prepares them for the entrance examinations and workloads of top public and private schools.

Counseling / Social Services

Provides year-round assistance, guidance and counseling to children in our programs, those in the community and their parents.

Early Childhood Literacy

In partnership with a number of public and private pre-schools in Central Harlem, the Clinic provides a holistic, comprehensive literacy program to help children become competent, confident readers at a young age.

Job Enrichment Development Initiative (J.E.D.I.)

A comprehensive job preparation training and social development program for high school and college students, the majority of whom are employed as tutors and counselors in our Summer Academic Enrichment Program.



Scholastic Aptitude Test (S.A.T.) Prep

Offers instruction in curricula needed for SAT exams required for entrance into college, including test-taking skills and strategies, and practice examinations for students in grade 11. We also offer individual counseling for college placement.



A.A.C.E. Program


The Academic Achievement and Cultural Enrichment Program is for academically-advanced minority students who are disadvantaged because their needs are not being met by the schools they attend.

Objectives:

To: Prepare academically-advanced minority students to gain places in top public and private schools.

Provide an enriched academic and cultural program for academically-advantaged students.

Provide a summer school program for children from private schools who failed to meet the academic requirements of their school.

Early Childhood Literacy Program

This comprehensive program uses a holistic, integrated approach to the development of language arts skills children ages 3-6, attending pre-kindergarten and kindergarten schools and daycare centers in Central Harlem, and helps them become competent readers at an early age.

"By providing our youngest children with a solid foundation in reading, we are sending them on to first grade ready to become proficient readers meeting or exceeding expectations."

Objectives:

- **To** Assist schools in Central Harlem improve the quality of their early childhood literacy programs.
- **To** Conduct workshops for teachers which demonstrate best practices and techniques for helping young children become confidents readers.
- **To** Provide reading and other support materials to supplement those being used by the teachers.
- **To** Ensure that the students in the program can read comfortably at the grade one level by the time they complete kindergarten.

School year 10 teachers 1 staff developer 190 children

Includes one home school with <u>7</u> students.

One Saturday Program for three, four and five year olds.

Outcomes: Kindergarten classes took the SESAT II Reading Section of the Stanford Achievement

Test. The average percentile for the sounds and letters section was 88 for word

reading was 90 and for sentence reading 95th percentile.

Four year olds who have been in the program for two years took the SESAT I test using kindergarten norms for September. The average score for the sounds and letters section was <u>97</u> and Word Reading <u>87</u>th percentile.

The average score for three-year olds on the Ready to Read Test was $\underline{17}$ indicating that they are ready to read.

Sixteen first graders concentrated on the common core objective in which the children used the text to justify answers to comprehension questions. The average score on a standardized reading test was <u>80</u>.



Job Enrichment Development Initiative (JEDI)

A comprehensive job-preparation and social skills development training program for high school and college students. A number of whom are subsequently employed as tutors and counselors in the Summer Program.

Objectives:


To Provide a comprehensive job-preparation training program for high school and college students so as to equip them for employment

To Facilitate the employment of approximately 70 students as tutors and counselors in the Summer Academic Enrichment Program.

To Enable these youngsters to earn a stipend.

To Foster an understanding and appreciation of the link between education and earning potential.

To: Give participants test-taking strategies so that they may receive competitive scores enabling them to attend colleges of their choice.

To: Provide college counseling to students and parents.

Summer Academic Enrichment Program

Provides opportunities for students to maintain gains made during the school year in reading, writing and math, and prepares them for the work of the upcoming grades.

Objectives:

To Help children improve their reading, writing, and math skills.

To Provide cultural activities which improve their fund of common knowledge in theform of trips.

To Provide wholesome recreational and sporting activities.

Duration:

25 days during summer

Staff:

- 1 Executive Director
- 1 Summer School Director
- 3 Summer school supervisors
- 18 Teachers/Assistant teachers
- 49 Tutors
- 11 HCZ Outsourced Interns
- 1 Volunteer Tutor



Participants: 206 Pre-K-3 to Grade 6

Outcomes: Children were given a pre-test and post-test and the scores were com-

pared.

Results: Prevented summer learning loss for the majority of the participants

Reading: 72% made gains

26% maintained their gains

Math: 71 % made gains

27% maintained their gains
