Old name – New direction Ray Cook putters making return to golf scene

ho says you can't change perfection? Raymond Cook proved that you could. Cook was an engineer, inventor and passionate golfer. He introduced his first forged aluminum mallet (the popular M1 Mallet) in 1963.

Known as the "Putter Man", Cook has watched as his putters have helped top professionals capture more than 200 PGA Tour wins, including all four major championships. Even with this success, Cook continued to perfect his putters to help golfers of all skill levels improve on the greens.

Cook's company was auctioned off in 2011 to Adams Golf, but now is now under the direction of the New Zealand company of Linkz Marketing, based in Kelson, Auckland, and they have resurected the brand.

Their hope is to bring back the putter lines to the "glory"



days of the 60's, 70's and 80's.

A good start is the restyled, revamped Gyro Series putters.

Olde Sycamore Golf Plantation *Premier Tom Jackson golfing experience*

arolina's noted Hall of Fame architect Tom Jackson has built many high-profile courses in the Carolinas, and his Olde Sycamore Golf Plantation design through majestic Carolina tall pines – has to rank among his best.

Looking into a wide fairway from the elevated tee on the par-5 first hole, Olde Sycamore sends a message early that you have found golfing pleasure just a few minutes outside I-485 on eastbound NC Hwy 218.

Saluted as the "Best New Course" when it opened in May of 1997, Olde Sycamore is now recognized as one of the best established and conditioned courses in the Greater Charlotte area. Nestled among a mature forest of hardwoods, it is not extremely long at 6965 yards from the tips, but it does require some shot making and course management for you to post a good score.

Fairways are hybrid Bermuda and the undulating Crenshaw bent grass greens are among the best in the Charlotte region. A nice touch at Olde Sycamore is the use of Zoysia grass around the bunkers, allowing for greater definition around each green.

Each hole is punctuated by a large, perfectly manicured green, and the




speed of the greens can be very fast at times and firm to hold your approach shots.

"The Crenshaw bent greens are as fast as you will find around Charlotte," says Wilkins. "They typically roll about a 10 on the stimpmeter. Most courses won't cut them that short, because of the summer heat, but we closely monitor the greens and make sure that every greens complex stays in good shape."

Owner B.V. Belk, who developed the course in 1997, has continued to improve the playability and conditions by reevaluating the course on a regular basis.

"Tom Jackson has come back and gone over every hole to see what we could do to make it better. He recommended a few minor changes and we've done those. The greens are in great condition, and the whole course is about as good as it can be."

The back nine seems to favor golfers that can play the ball from right to left,



while the front nine caters to the faders. After that sweeping 516 yard par-5 first hole that plays downhill off the tee shot, doglegs left, and then comes back uphill on the approach, the remainder of the front nine is dominated by doglegs and blind approach shots.

"After you get through the first four holes, the golf course shows its true personality," said General Manager and Head PGA Professional Barry Wilkins. "Getting the ball in the right position to approach our large greens is a must, and that takes shots of all shapes."

The front side is capped off by one of the course's best par fours - the number one handicap 442 yard 9th hole.

The back nine is as jaw droppingly beautiful as it is challenging. Slightly more traditional in its layout, the ride-in features better views of landing areas and greens. It also houses two of Charlotte's best par 5's - the 601 yard 12th and the 528 yard 18th.

Olde Sycamore is a strong test of your golfing skills from any of the "play forward" tee boxes. Ryder Cup waiting game Player selections complete after Tour Championship

ime is winding down before the eight USA automatic qualifiers for this year's Ryder Cup are set on August 28th, and the foursome of Americans playing in the return of golf to the Olympics have made an 11th-hour statement.

Only Patrick Reed, who moved to eighth on the points list, is currently qualified for the U.S. team, with Bubba Watson (No. 10), Matt Kuchar (No. 11) and Rickie Fowler (No. 12) likely all vying for one of four captain's picks.

The four U.S. Olympians will only have two more starts, The Wyndham Championship and The Barclays, to move into the automatic qualifiers; otherwise they would need to be a pick. "We obviously all want to be part of that team," Fowler said.

"Are there points? No!" proclaimed U.S. Captain Davis Love, III. "But they're taking away something that's so much more valuable than points and that's playing for their country. That's going to prove to be a valuable experience whether they're in the top-8 for Ryder Cup or on the team as a Captain's Pick. They're going to inspire with the stories of their experiences."

The top 8 qualifiers will be set after The Barclays on Aug. 28 and U.S. captain Davis Love III will make three of his four picks after the BMW Championship on Sept. 12. The final pick will be made after the Tour Championship on Sept. 25.

Top eight players on the Ryder Cup standings as of August 12th: (1) Dustin Johnson, (2) Jordan Spieth, (3) Phil Mickleson, (4) Jimmy Walker, (5) Brooks Koepka, (6) Zach Johnson, (7) J.B. Holmes and (8) Patrick Reed.

In addition to the Olympians several other players have been playing well enough to merit a look from U.S. Captain Davis Love III. Brandt Snedeker is a close 9th behind Patrick Reed; Daniel Berger is playing very solid golf including a win at the St. Jude Classic; while American assistant captain Jim Furyk made PGA history with the first-ever 58 at the Travelers to move to #18.


Is Davis Love feeling the pressure of making the right selection for the Ryder Cup team?

"Obviously we know 4-5 of them now, but it'll be nice to firm up the last few." said Love. "Sunday -- the 28th -- will be a big day. That's when it really hits home that we need to start making the picks. All of us captains and assistants have talked, but we can't narrow it down too much until then. We'll have a couple of weeks to decide what to do. We have a short list, but things can change. That day - the 28th - is a big day."

What about European Captain Darren Clarke? Is his selection process any clearer than Davis Love's?

Of the nine guaranteed qualifiers in the rankings for the Europeans, there are five rookies among them - Danny Willett, Chris Wood, Matt Fitzpatrick and Andy Sullivan of England plus Rafa Cabrera-Bello of Spain. And even though not qualified, Travelers Champion Russell Knox would love to be added to the new class of European competitors.

That's a lot of newcomers. Is Clarke really going to make it six rookies? Or will he want to bolster his

group by going with more players who have felt the heat of battle in past Ryder Cups?

Clarke has a core leadership group of just four - Rory McIlroy, Henrik Stenson, Sergio Garcia and Justin Rose. Lee Westwood and Martin Kaymer won't qualify automatically but they will be two of Clarke's wildcards and up until recently the third one looked like it was heading the way of Graeme McDowell, another experienced Ryder Cup operator to counterbalance all the first-timers in the European team.

The Europeans have dominated the Ryder Cup winning the last three, including the 2014 event at Gleneagles, Scotland 16 ½ - 11 ½. The U.S. leads the all-time event 25-12-2, but the Europeans have now captured 8 of the last 10, with only the 1999 and 2008 American victory's at Brookline and Louisville to spoil a clean sweep since 1993.

The 41st Ryder Cup will be played at Hazeltine National Golf Club is Chaska, Minnesota starting on September 30th through October 2nd. The question remains - can the Americans win?



Stuart Clark Wins Carolinas Assistant PGA Professional Championship at River Run

The 2016 National Car Rental Carolinas Assistant PGA Professional Championship was held at River Run Country Club in Davidson, NC, and Stuart Clark, a PGA apprentice and Teaching Professional at the Steve Dresser Golf Academy in Pawleys Island, SC, carded rounds of 68-74 for a 2-under par total of 142 to finish in a three-way tie for first place.

Joining him in a sudden death playoff on the 18th hole were Savio Nazareth of Greensboro, and Anthony Cordes from Pinehurst, who also finished with 142. Clark made his birdie putt on 18 while Nazareth and Cordes missed theirs, securing him the championship.

Along with his victory, Clark earns a spot in the 40th National Car Rental Assistant PGA Professional Championship to be held October 27-30 at PGA Golf Club in Port St. Lucie, Florida later this year.

The winner of the 40th National Car Rental Assistant PGA Professional Championship earns \$9,000 out of a total purse of \$100,000. The Champion, if eligible, earns a berth in the 50th PGA Professional Championship, June 25-28, 2017 at Sunriver Resort in Oregon.

Carolinas Open Championship finishes in heated three-hole playoff

rew Younts of Stokesdale, NC in Guilford County captured the 92nd Carolinas Open presented by BB&T at Bryan Park Golf & Conference Center in Greensboro by way of a three-hole playoff over Thomas Lilly of Newton, NC.

Younts, a PGA Apprentice Teaching Professional at Precision Golf School in Greensboro, entered the third and final round with a three stroke lead after two flawless rounds of 68-67 (-9). The pressure of the final round seemed to change his situation as Younts'




game went hot and cold. He carded five birdies, seven pars, and five bogies in route to a 35-38=73 (+1) for a total of 208 (-8).

Lilly, a college amateur at UNC Wilmington, opened the tournament with a 74, but closed with rounds of 67-67 to also finish at 208 (-8) to force a playoff.

On the third hole, both competitors hit wild tee shots - Younts to the right and Lilly to the left. Younts was able to advance his ball to the front left greenside bunker, but Lilly caught a tree with his approach and then hit his wedge to 30 feet.

After carefully examining his shot, Younts nearly holed his 60-foot bunker shot, leaving it two feet


away. As Lilly's par attempt rolled to the hole, the crowd could tell it was going to be close. However, the line and speed were just off as the ball finished three inches away. Younts rolled in the winning putt and gave an enthusiastic fist pump to signal his satisfaction with the victory.



Two Charlotte assistants pros also advanced to the National Championship: Aaron Black, Edgewater Golf Club, finished fourth while Cedarwood Country Club assistant Barry Pierce captured the fifth qualifying spot.

Runner-up Savio Nazareth, Forest Oaks Country Club, followed his strong showing in the Assistant Championship with a 6-under par 66 to qualify

for the Wyndham Championship. This will be Nazareth's third appearance in the Greensboro PGA event at Sedgefield Country Club.

W ith a bee hive of home building activity going on at Larkin Golf Club in Statesville, you can feel the energy intensifying for the well-established golf course that once was known at Fox Den Golf Club when it opened in 1996.

Routed through beautiful rolling hills with scenic views, Larkin GC designer Clyde Johnston used his talent to sculpt a challenging and enjoyable course for players of all skill levels.

His design takes full advantage of the 400-acres of lush countryside wrapped around Third Creek that makes its way throughout the course.



Johnston is the son of PGA golf professional and former golf coach at Wake Forest College, C.B. "Johnny" Johnston. Clyde spent his youth playing golf as well as working on the golf course maintenance staff at his father's golf course.

Bermuda fairways, Crenshaw Bent-Grass greens, and nine scenic ponds add to the enjoyment of this beautifully designed course, kept in great



condition by Course Superintendent Shane Staples.

In an overall assessment, the course is an excellent Johnston design with accommodating fairways - some tightly tree-lined and others open off the tee and receptive good-sized greens. The course length varies from 7005 yards from the gold tees down to 5300 yards from the red.

"We are committed to providing a leading quality golf experience to players of all ages and abilities by enhancing their enjoyment of the great game of golf," said golf course manager Gene Lemmers.

"We have been able to upgrade our staff to meet golfers, be more aggressive with maintenance, add merchandise to the pro shop and provide the best rates anytime."

Establishing A Pre-Shot Routine

I n order to repeat fundamentals and repeat golf swings you've got to have a good pre-shot routine. No different than a routine you would have in the morning; waking up, taking a shower, getting in your car and going - it's a routine that happens the same way every time. That's what you're looking to do in a golf swing.

When establishing a pre-shot routine, remember the **4 fundamentals** that will keep your routine simple and easily repeatable: **grip**, **aim**, **ball**



position and posture.

#1: The first thing you must do has to happen behind the ball - put your hands on the golf club.

#2: Next, aim from
behind the ball picking a secondary target
a spot that is anywhere from 5 inches to
5 feet between you and
your primary target.
Your primary target

could be the flagstick, a tree, etc. You always want to aim from behind the ball because your aim is more accurate when looking at an object





head-on opposed to looking at it from the side. The minute you step to the side to look at something your accuracy will be off by 50%.

#3: As you walk into the ball, aim your clubface to your secondary target and then set your posture from the waist up which will determine your distance from the ball. Most golfers set their feet first and then their clubface but you need to do just the opposite.

#4: The final step is very important. Make sure to look at the target while setting your feet and body, don't set-up first and then look. Always

look first and then set your feet and align your body.

To recap, the 4 fundamentals of an easy to remember pre-shot routine are; grip, aim, ball position and posture.

Establish your routine and stick with it every single time you play. And remember, the target is the last thing you look at before you hit the ball and the first thing you look at after you hit the ball.

Bright Blessings founders, John and Amy Cervantes have a twofold mission of engaging volunteers of all ages to help brighten the lives of needy children.



You can help by being a part of the Bright Blessings Charity Golf Classic – October 14th at Raintree Country Club. The shot-gun start is 12:30pm.





Saying "it was nice to come home again", Golf Channel on-air personality Charlie Rymer made his latest home visit a beneficial one for his former high school golf teams.

Rymer, who graduated from Ft. Mill in 1986, appeared at the Ft. Mill Golf Club and used his gift of gab telling stories and auctioning a variety of items to raise nearly \$10,000 for the Ft. Mill boys' and girls' golf teams.

Rymer's family moved to Ft. Mill from Cleveland, Tennessee during his elementary school years and quickly made a name for himself on the South Carolina



golf scene. A big trophy he brought home from a tournament win in Newberry convinced his father that Charlie "had a future" in golf.

Rymer was part of three high school state championships at Ft. Mill and won multiple individual state high school championships, and he also won the State Junior three times. He earned Carolinas player of the year honors in 1985 and played on numerous all-star teams.

Following high school, Rymer received a scholarship at

Georgia Tech, where he won five collegiate tournaments. After college, he played mini-tours early in his professional golf days before making the PGA Tour from 1995-97. But he failed to keep his playing privileges and missed advancing from qualifying school by one stroke. "I was like a dog chasing his tail," he said, "but golf was all I had ever done."

Facing reality, he pondered his future and remembers meeting Gary McCord on the practice tee at the Hootie and the Blowfish Monday after the Masters. "He asked me what I was going to do, and we talked a while," Rymer said. "Then, he asked, why don't you do TV? You're an idiot, you qualify for TV."

The combination of Rymer and television clicked, and golf is still his life. His friendship with golf broadcasters led to an audition, and he worked with CBS, ABC, ESPN and the USA Network prior to joining the Golf Channel. He remains active in promoting junior golf.

He and wife Carol and their two sons live in Orlando, Fla, but after his recent visit, you could tell his heart is still committed to his "home town" – Ft. Mill.



More than a walk in the park... A walk into history at FORT MILL GOLF CLUB

hen the Fort Mill Golf Club was built back in 1948 it was designed to give Leroy Springs Company employees a place to relax and enjoy a comfortable round of golf. But what was once a company perk, is now public golfers delight.

Kudos goes to the Springs Company for having the foresight to hire the best to design their new course. Legendary Donald Ross laid out the front nine, a masterpiece of a jigsaw puzzle with every hole fitting into the character of the rolling hills and tree-lined fairways. The beauty of the front nine is that with its Ross design, it may be one of the most comfortable walking courses in the Charlotte area.

There is of course the Ross touch, but none more apparent than the backto-back 6th and 7th holes. The 6th is a 406 yard par-4 (white tees) with the slightest of a dogleg right through the oaks, with an uphill second to an elevated green with a steep Ross-style front. If you don't carry the second shot far enough, the ball could come right back toward you. Take at least one more club, a little long and on the green is a good thing.

The 7th, which was the original starting hole when the side opened in 1948, is a dogleg left from an elevated tee by the clubhouse. The green is partially hidden by new mounds that are just over two sand bunkers that are at least 10-yards in front of the green, giving you the Ross "false front" appearance. Again, correct club selection is a must to master Mr. Ross's mind game.

The back nine, which opened several decades later than the Donald Ross front nine, was designed by George Cobb - in his own right one of the premier golf course designers. Of the 100's of his course designs, in





addition to Fort Mill, the Charlotte area enjoys several top-rated courses including Quail Hollow, Carmel CC (North), Cabarrus CC in Concord, and Rolling Hills CC in Monroe.

Cobb's 1959 design is also very walkable with a similar green to tee box distance as found on the front side. Two holes that are most talked about on the back nine are the par-5's. Hole #12 measuring 538 yards from the white tees plays over a pond off the tee, and a uphill approach into the green. If it was a strain to score well at #12, the 553 yard 16th hole can be a round saver. Playing a couple of shots easier, the approach shot here is severely downhill into a friendly green.

Ft. Mill was a pioneer in greens conversion in the Greater Charlotte area, switching from bent-grass to Bermuda in 2008. At the same time both sides benefitted greatly from Clyde Johnston's renovation. On the Donald Ross front side, Johnston went with old drawings of the Ross original design - adding and subtracting bunkers and mounds to accent the "false front" trademark. The work on the back side was mostly cosmetic.

Fort Mill is the home of Marc Lapointe Golf which has added an excellent golf learning experience for golfers of all levels. Located on the driving range, golfers have five target greens, a short game practice area with a bunker to help improve your short game and a large Bermuda putting green.


The Sugar Mountain Golf Club may be the best kept secret in mountain golf, but not for long.

fter 15 years in the position, Darin MacDonald has resigned as the executive director of the BMW Charity Pro-Am presented by Synnex.




MacDonald, along with former BMW Executive Bobby Hitt and Doug McGrath changed the PGA Tour event from a small regular Tour tournament
