

Webb Simpson putts for big win...again! by Sam Smith

hile transplanted Charlotte resident Webb Simpson was running away from the best of the PGA Tour to capture the Players Championship, his 5th career championship, the struggle to regain his putting touch seemed like a century ago. "I'm thankful that I've put together a year of pretty solid putting, and it's really helped my golf, kind of getting me to be the player that I want to be," Simpson said.

Webb, born in Raleigh, not only has renewed confidence in

his game with the putting problem apparently solved, he also has several other things that may have been more important.

His father (Sam), who passed way in 2017, told his son, "Never give up, never quit." That encouraging mantra combined with the love and caring nature of his mother. Debbie, and his faith in God, Webb was able to battle his adversity with patience and determination to succeed again.

And finally in his recovery puzzle, Webb leaned on a strong determined person to stand by his

side, his Wake Forest sweetheart and wife Dowd. They both declare that the couple's faith is something that keeps them grounded, and they try to keep it at the forefront of their lives despite their busy schedule. They travel together along with their three daughters and one son to as many tournaments as possible.

"It's always fun to watch Webb play, and now that he is putting

more fun to watch him compete," said Dowd. "I hope that the fans are enjoying his renewed PGA golf game, and will continue to give him the great support they have given him in the past."

Reaching a peak in his young career after graduating in 2008 from Wake Forest, Simpson won twice in 2011: Wyndham, Greensboro; Deutsche Bank, Boston. His stock skyrocketed following a stellar performance at the Olympic Club in San Francisco to win the 2012 U.S Open. His last win, prior to The Players was in the first wraparound season of the PGA in October of 2013 at the Shriners Children tournament in Las Vegas.

All of his first four wins came before the PGA

tional style of putting, Webb's game was going in the wrong direction, dropping from Top-20 in Strokes Gained: putting to a low of 177th on the PGA list.

"To be at the bottom of the barrel like we were, I didn't know if he'd ever putt well again," said Simpson's caddie, Paul Tesori. "When you putt that poorly for that length of time and you play at this level, you can't hide."

It's ironic that the turn-around for Webb came just a year ago at The Players, when a former ACC Player of the Year Tim Clark of NC State offered a possible solution to Webb's putting problems.

Clark suggested a grip that was a hybrid between the claw and Matt Kuchar's way of securing the shaft against his left forearm. Simpson put it in play without any practice, and something immediately clicked - he shot 4 under for the first two rounds, ultimately tying for 16th. Over the rest of the year, after creating his own style - the "Kuchar-claw," with the shaft pinned against his left forearm - Simpson climbed more than 100 spots in the rankings.

mature ultra-dwarf Bermuda greens and Tifway 419 Bermuda fairways.

With some serious elevation changes and wide landing areas, Rocky River gets high marks for its pace of play, friendly staff and conditioning. It is home of the Charlotte 49ers short-game practice facility and appeals to golfers of all skill levels.

The recently expanded clubhouse is available for events and meetings, and can accommodate up to 115 guests. As a City-owned facility, the course offers discounted rates for Concord residents. ong before Jason Day nearly knocked down the pin at Quail Hollow's #17, or dropped in the final putt to earn his 12th PGA title at the 2018 Wells Fargo Championship, he had started a chain of changes that have pushed the former #1 player all the way back into the Top 10 at #2 in the world rankings after dropping into the low 100's.

The victory at Quail Hollow was his second of the year, with both coming after Day made a dramatic switch in his TaylorMade golf clubs the week of his earlier victory at the Farmers Insurance Championship in January at Torrey Pines, his first victory since the Players Championship back in May 2016.

The 2015 PGA Champion replaced all his TaylorMade P-750 irons with the company's sleeker P-730 blade irons. Day made the 11th hour decision to switch clubs after the WGC-Dell Match Play where he failed to progress beyond the group stage.

"I don't know what happened, but they performed okay last year and I went from an offset to an onset iron last year, which was my old set that I'm not using right now, but I just couldn't quite get the gain, the trajectory, and the control that I wanted to."

Day has played TaylorMade clubs since mid-2006 and is currently using the new M3 driver in the bag. Other pros using the M3 include Rory McIlroy, Tiger Woods and Justin Rose. The 30-year-old is the PGA Tour's 12th longest hitter this season, averaging 311 yards off the tee. During the Farmers tournament, Day played the M1 3-wood in 15° of loft, but for the Wells Fargo he switched to a newer M4 fairway wood in a weaker 16.5° loft.

During his practice range sessions at Quail Hollow, with TaylorMade reps buzzing all around, Day was hard at work refining the carry of each of the new irons that have been modified several times to fit his distance needs. But all the while, not going away from his friendly demeanor he has always displayed, even taking time to offer a "G'day mate" to this very interested journalist.

It was a "New Day" at the Wells Fargo Championship

With much of the conversation on the tour centered on Day's interesting club change timing, maybe the most important change came from the man right behind him on the range. Day split with long-time caddy Colin Swatton last fall after 10 years together, but retained Swatton as his swing coach.

"I think when you have your coach on the bag, you kind of not worry but you kind of think, OK, well, he's going to say something about this shot, so I better not play that shot, you know," Day said. "So, hopefully having my good close buddy out there with me now we can make things a little less stressful and go out there and have fun."

Swatton's replacement is 31-year old Luke Reardon, a former roommate and practice partner for Day at the Hills International School in their teens in Australia. Another good friend from Australia, Rika Batibasaga has also been on the bag for several tournaments, includ-

ing Day's last Masters, when Reardon was finalizing his visa to work tournaments in the United States.



Amidst

all of the changes to improve Day's play and happiness on the PGA Tour, one element of his game has not taken any twist or turns - he still putts with the TaylorMade Spider Tour Red putter where he ranks 1st in Gained: Putting on the PGA Tour this season. If that continues he may well be pushing the world number one spot again in the not too distant future.

As thousands of Charlotte area golf fans can say "we were there" to watch the changes make a difference when they counted, Jason Day weathered a few bumps along the way to still capture our "home again" Wells Fargo Championship on his climb back to the top of the world of golf.

Exercise maintains the body's ability to recover, as well as its ability to help motor learning and the cognitive skills associated with golf. Walking, swimming, and bicycling are all recommended as non-strenuous activities for maintaining fitness as we age. Even consider changing your golfing schedule to include walking nine holes as a weekly routine.

I do not buy into the popular saying, "you can't teach an old-dog new tricks." Nonsense! It has everything to do with your mindset, and the better we feel physically, effects how we think. Birkdale Golf Club regaining premier prominence

ith the weather finally turning toward summer, the warmer temperatures have accelerated the growth of the grass and surroundings greatly in the past several weeks. Aided by the new management company – Pinnacle Golf - Birkdale Golf Club, designed by golf legend Arnold Palmer, certainly has made a striking turn-around on its road to retuning as one of Charlotte's premier golf courses.

The on-course attention to details is drawing positive attention as players return to enjoy the challenging 7,000 yard, par-72 layout that opened to rave reviews in 1997. With the hiring of former Carolina Golf Club Superintendent Ben Albrecht, he has added a great deal of experience to the maintenance program at Birkdale.

"With Ben's guidance and the great support of Pinnacle Golf, things that needed improving have been done, with more to come," said Birkdale General Manager Jeff Thomas. "Some trees have been removed to clean-up the course and improve the sight line on several holes. Some greens that had winter damage have been re-sodded, while the 56 bunkers have been cleaned up and filled with new sand. They may be the best ever in the 6-years I have been at Birkdale."

Located on 200 acres of rolling terrain, carved between tall pines and natural streams, Birkdale is made up of Bermuda fairways and Crenshaw bent grass greens. New turf equipment & maintenance vehicles have made noticeable improvements with more consistent mowing and grooming of greens and fairways.



Even with its length, Palmer used the four sets of tees at Birkdale to mix the big "grip-it-and-rip-it" holes with shorter shot-maker holes to test your course management and game strategy. The course features a number of elevation changes, which are appealing to the eye and adds to the challenge. Well-placed water hazards and bunkers require players to use every shot in their bag.

Many holes have doglegs and a couple of the short par-4 holes are almost drive-



able. The par 3 holes are all solid challenges, while two tough holes feature watery approach shots into well-guarded greens. One is the 569yd par-5 5th hole where your 3rd shot must carry water over a rock-faced wall to a long, narrow green.

Still another good water approach shot comes on the 436 yard, par-4 18th into another long right-to-left sloping green that is well guarded in both front and back by large well-conditioned bunkers. This hole looks great from the clubhouse patio, but it will certainly keep your attention to the final shot of the day.

"This golf course is blessed with 'good bones' providing a solid foundation for our improvement efforts," said Thomas. "Many of the players are complementing our staff on the upgrading of the condition of the course and we are all very happy to see Birkdale getting back in form. That reconfirms our renewed commitment to providing a great golf experience"

Birkdale Golf Club Membership offers easy access with no initiation fees, no food and beverage minimum spending requirements and no assessments. With easy automatic month to month membership billing for your membership dues, and three levels of membership from which to choose, Birkdale Golf Club has a membership to fit your lifestyle.

he Etowah Valley located in the Southern Highlands where the Great Smoky Mountains weave through the Southern Blue Ridge, creating a scenic plateau 2,200 feet high and 75 miles wide, has been a popular destination for individual golfers and groups for more than 50 years.

Set against the panoramic backdrop of the mountains in northwestern North Carolina, Etowah Valley Golf & Resort offers a blend of three challenging nine-hole golf courses, comfortable lodging, three dining venues, down-home hospitality and exceedingly attractive prices for stay-and-play packages.

Yardages for the courses range from 2,556 to 3,422 on the South Nine, 2,396 to 3,503 on the West Nine and 2,343 to 3,318 on the North Nine.

The North course opened in 1988 to augment the original 18 holes. The South and West courses lend themselves to walking for those who wish, but the much hillier North course is best traversed in a riding cart.

Owner Kevin Griffin, a retired Asheville firefighter and owner of Hi-Alta Real Estate, was quick to hire Jim Sparks of Cashiers-based Course Doctors to rehabilitate the course. Sparks was able to utilize the length needed to be challenging for the better golfer, but still give golfers of all levels a comfortable round of golf on a variety of courses that will bring them back again and again.

"Some groups have been coming to Etowah for years", said General Manager Tim Rice. "They almost feel like family, but our staff continues to treat them as 'very special guests'. G olfers in South Carolina have had a smile on their face for some time because they knew something the players north of them were just finding out.

The par-3 fourth hole features an island tee and asks players to hit a 230-yard, uphill shot over water to a green protected by a steep front. If you want something less than the back tees, Edgewater offers that, too. The course has five sets of tee stations. The greens are big and gently contoured, not overdone. Par for the course is 72. From the back tees the course plays to 7,103 yards; from the forward tees the course plays to 4,717 yards. Play forward and enjoy your round.

The Edgewater staff will make the first positive impression meeting you at the parking lot with your cart, verify your tee time and offer directions to the pro shop and driving range. And the best part is the affordability - only \$43 during the week (\$52 weekends)

NC Golf Panel's An

NC Golf Panel's Annual Top 50 Courses "You can play list" has strong Pinehurst flavor

G iven that the Pinehurst area is a bucket-list destination for avid golfers worldwide, it's no surprise that Sandhills courses dominate the top of the North Carolina Golf Panel's rankings of the Top 50 Courses "You Can Play" for 2018.

Pinehurst No. 2, Pine Needles Lodge and Golf Club, Pinehurst No. 8, Pinehurst No. 4, and Mid Pines Inn and Golf Club occupy the top five spots. The sixth through 10th rankings show evidence of the state's diverse offerings of daily-fee courses from the mountains to the coast: Linville Golf Club (Linville), Pinehurst No. 9 (Pinehurst), UNC Finley Golf Course (Chapel Hill), Duke University Golf Club (Durham), and Bald Head Island Club (Bald Head Island).



"A few years ago some golf-crazy friends of mine from New Mexico came to visit for most of a week," says Kevin Brafford, the Panel's executive director. "One day we were playing just a few hundred yards away from the Atlantic Ocean – a couple of them had never even seen an ocean. Three days later, we were playing with the Blue Ridge Mountains as a backdrop. And in between we played courses in Southern Pines and Concord. They were in awe of the whole experience."

This marks the 23rd year that the N.C. Golf Panel has rated courses in what's widely regarded as one of the best states for golf in the country. Members also voted on the Top 100 Courses in the state and the top dozen courses by region. As has been the case every year, Pinehurst No. 2 leads the Top 100, followed by Grandfather Golf and Country Club (Linville), Mountaintop Golf and Lake Club (Cashiers), the Country Club of



North Carolina's Dogwood course (Pinehurst), and the Old North State Club (New London).

Both the Top 50 "You Can Play" and the Top 100 in the State rankings are determined by a scoring system where panelists consider among these factors: routing, design, strategy, memorability, fairness, variety and aesthetics.

Lastly, panelists were asked to answer this question: If you had to put together a three-day golf trip within the state, playing only courses that are open to the public, where would you go and play? Those answers, as well as the complete rankings, can be found at NCGolfPanel.com.



Mt. Mitchell Golf Club Maintains cool mountain golf get-away status

s the late spring weather points to the usual hot summer in the Greater Charlotte area, golfers are starting to formulate plans to escape the heat and head to the cooler Blue Ridge Mountains. The selection is good, however one location has remained a steady pick for cool mountain golf – Mt. Mitchell Golf Club just off the Blue Ridge Parkway near Burnsville.

As the comfortable mountain air freshens in the early morning, and another 70's temperature day is forecast, golfers can almost see the entire course brightens with every hour. The tee-thru green bent grass (rough included) makes Mt. Mitchell one of the most unusual golf courses in the United States.

Golf course architect Fred Hawtree designed the course, his only design in the United States, and it is consistently regarded as one of North Carolina's top public golf layouts by Golfweek magazine. (As high as #11 in "Best of the State" rankings)

Hawtree didn't prescribe the wall-to-wall bent grass for the entire course, but due to the valley location of the par-72 layout the owners made the selection to stand out against one of Eastern America's premier mountain peaks.

"We are at 3,000 feet and Mount Mitchell, the highest peak east of the Mississippi, is at 6,684 feet just three miles away as the crow flies but goes up 3,600 feet, which is pretty dramatic," said owner and co-founder Jim Floyd.



"Despite being surrounded by mountains, we're unlike most mountain courses because it is not uphill and downhill very much. It's pretty accessible to all types of golfers."

Not long by today's standards, the back tees measure just 6,495 yards, however with the South Toe River, teaming with trophy-size trout, winding



its way in, around and through the course, accuracy is a must. Golfers play a relatively flat front nine, with elevation changes starting at No. 10, and ending with a 125-foot drop to a descending fairway into the finishing hole over water.

Golfers that like to mix their golf with other activities have always been pleased with the "catch-and-release" trout fishing that is provided by the Mt. Mitchell Golf Club on the South Toe River.

"We've got probably the finest quality trout stream in Western North Carolina because we are the first private land the river hits coming out of the national forest, and we have cultivated the stream with trout," said Jim Floyd.

"It's neat that our membership has turned it into a trophy trout stream. And it is kind of a tradition now to feed the fish

on No. 2 tee box and then at the bridge on No. 15."

With accommodations right on site, including a variety of 25 homes for rent or at the resort's fairway townhomes and condos, Mt. Mitchell has long been a perfect destination for golfing buddies weekends or family vacations. There is a variety of stay-and-play packages available with excellent evening dining at Hawtree's Grill & Pub in the main clubhouse, and snack service located below the golf pro shop.



Hiking to waterfalls, gemstone mining, an abundant of craft studios and shops, excellent summer theater schedule at the Parkway Playhouse in Burnsville provides plenty of activities for all ages away from the golf course.

Eagle Chase Golf Club *"Hidden Jewel of Union County"*

or years the Carolina Golf Journal has labeled Eagle Chase Golf Club the "Hidden Jewel of Union County", but according to the numerous course reviews by avid Golf Advisor golfers, the Tom Jackson layout isn't totally unknown.

Eagle Chase Golf Club, located in Marshville, NC, stands as one of the most unique golf courses in the Greater Charlotte area. Eagle Chase's layout features drastic elevation changes on several holes, giving players a mountain golfing experience, a couple of hours east of the Appalachian Mountains.

Built in 1994, Eagle Chase is situated in northern Union County, just to the east of Charlotte. The course's green complexes require a variety of shots, as they sit in both valleys and atop hills. Many of the tee boxes are elevated and offer picturesque views of the Uwharries in the distance.



With the unique character and course conditions, Eagle Chase has drawn excellent ratings from golfadvisor.com including the #12 designation among golf course in the state of North Carolina. Added to that lofty rating in North Carolina, with rates ranging between \$34 and \$46 and only \$28 for seniors on weekdays, Eagle Chase has also been selected as the #15 golf course for value in the United States.

"We are so happy that the avid golfers have recognized our course as an excellent place to play," said General Manager/Golf Professional Wally Moore. "One key to our success is conversion of our greens from bent grass to Diamond Zoysia several years ago, and we feel they may be some of the best in the Charlotte area."

The golf course is hidden among the farmland, and you will not find houses or other man-made distractions to spoil your round of golf.

Generous fairways offer plenty of landing room and very few hazards. Even though the terrain of this course is relatively hilly, there are no hidden hazards



that will sneak up and grab you. From the elevated tees, you will have a bird's eye view of what lies ahead and the task at hand. Avoid the tree line and you should have a good line to the pin. Make some putts and you can card a good score here.

Water comes into play on first 3 holes and 7 of 18 overall. A favorite hole of all level of players is #6, a 189 yd-par 3 with elevated tee and a pond on the right and back side. Playing downhill, it doesn't play full-length but being on the right level of this pear-shape green is a must for a good score. Another popular hole is "Big Cut" #13, a 332 yd par-4 with a pond off the tee across and up the right side. A nice little fade leaves a short approach shot into a friendly back-to-front sloping green.

Eagle Chase stretches 6723-yards from the back tees, with a course rating of 72.6/128 slope; from the white tees you are looking at 6100-yards (69.4/122) and from the red tees the course runs 5139-yards (69.6/121).

Eagle Chase provides an excellent practice area including a multi-target range and putting green that is conditioned to give you an early feel of the 18 greens you face on your round.
