Over several weekends in April, our youth took part in a Beautification and Handicap Accessibility Project at the Chapel Hill Unit-

ed Methodist Church. To facilitate accessibility by wheelchair bound visitors to the church's community garden, three high raised table top garden beds were built. Additionally, a hardscape was added using recycled bricks.

CSR Lead Specialist, Joe Medellin, assisted by CSR Specialist Joe Villescaz, helped realize this project. Karen Sinclair, Chapel Hill Volunteer, served as project site coordinator.

With support from our state partner, Texas Ramp Project, our youth continue to build wheelchair ramps in the local community










Bienvenido


