Clobal Youth Service Day

Global Youth Service Day (GYSD) celebrates the millions of children and youth around the world who improve their communities each day of the year through community service. In Texas, it is celebrated the entire month of April. Once again, the Texas Juvenile Justice Department (TJJD) served as the state's lead agency.

Over several weekends in April, our youth took part in a Beautification Project at St. Francis Episcopal Church. Over 950 sq. ft. of the church's main entryway was landscaped. Youth laid down weed barrier, spread mulch and decomposed granite, planted shrubs and plants, placed stone edging and river rocks, and much more. Plus, the church's marquee area and gen-



Photography Project

After a short hiatus, photography has been added back to our menu of service learning projects. We kicked-off this project on April 2nd. CSR Specialist, Melanie Castro, an amateur photographer herself, is project lead. She is ably assisted by parttime CSR Specialists, Pablo Villanueva and Sonia Benavides.

This project introduces kids to different genres of photography while emphasizing the basics of poise, position, background and lighting. It is taught through a combination of classroom instruction, field trips, and student projects.

A mandatory component of any credible service learning project is the participation of partners from the community. Particularly those with subject-matter expertise. We are, therefore, very thankful to Tricia Buchhorn, photography instructor at San Antonio College, and Julysa Sosa, staff photographer at St. Philip's College, who have been kind enough to share their expertise with our kids.

Next month, a field trip is planned to San Antonio College where photo editing will be taught. In specific, youth will be able to use state of the art photography equipment and software.

The project finale will entail our kids applying skills learned by taking photos of abandoned dogs and cats at God's Dog Rescue. These photos will then be used to enhance the rescue center's Adopt a Pet efforts.
